Public Forum: Jim Duval, Deputy Director of the Redevelopment Agency, noted that the Governor has prepared a proposal to assist in reducing the state's budget deficit by mandating the deposit to the state general fund those housing set-aside dollars that were unencumbered as of 12/1/02. Staff will monitor this proposal. The County Redevelopment Agency balance at the end of November 2002 was \$623,911.11, of this total, \$611,033.47 is encumbered, leaving a little over \$12,000 at risk. Ron Freitas, Director of Stanislaus County Planning and Community Development, noted that this is Supervisor Blom's last meeting sitting on the Stanislaus County Redevelopment Agency Board. He presented a plaque of appreciation to Supervisor Blom from the Redevelopment Agency.

Corr 5 Acknowledged receipt of claims and referred to the CEO-Risk Management Division the following claims: Michael Blaine; Enterprise Rent-A-Car; Jane Craig; John Van Horn; Samoeun Phok; and, Jane M. Wilson.

Supervisor Simon noted the presence of the new Modesto Bee reporter, Jeff Jardine, in the Chambers.

Supervisors Caruso, Blom and Paul attended the Ag Dinner on 12/5/02, which honored the J.S. West family. As Chairman of StanCOG, Supervisor Caruso received a memo yesterday, regarding the jobhousing balance in Stanislaus County in which the State rejected StanCOG's recommendation for building 20,000 homes, and instead the State recommended building 35,000 homes in the County.

Supervisor Paul noted that the Proposition 10 Commission (Stanislaus County Children and Families Commission) approved a portion of the cost for a piece of medical equipment that is used to exam children who may have been sexually assaulted. On Friday night, she attended the Women's Auxiliary Ball, which raises funds for scholarships for minority students. On Saturday she attended the City of Riverbank Christmas parade. Monday night she attended the League of Women Voters Holiday Fling presented by Marie Gallo and Grace Lieberman for the Gallo Arts Center.

The Assistant CEO reported on the State budget crisis. She noted that the Governor is proposing \$10.2 billion in budget cuts. Many of the budget cuts that are being suggested in the first round are referring to State government cuts. On January 10, 2003, Governor Davis will issue next year's budget proposals. Public library foundation funds will be wiped out if the Legislature adopts the State Budget proposals. Further reductions in Medical reimbursements could mean disaster statewide for the health care system. The whole County organization is paying attention to the State budget cuts, and will continue to update the Board regarding this issue. Supervisor Paul asked if the County is being aggressive enough in pursuing any legal options regarding the State taking money away from the counties. County Counsel noted that the County Counsel Association is reviewing the budget cuts. He expects that there will be litigation in the future. The Assistant CEO spoke regarding the proposed education cuts at \$1.7 billion.
